In the opening chapters of Hosea, God commands the prophet to marry a "woman of harlotry" who would be unfaithful to him. Hosea's marriage to Gomer, along with the children she bears, reflects the unfaithfulness of Israel to God, and His subsequent judgment and redemption of the nation.

- 10. In what five things will God betroth His people "in that day"? (2:18-20)
- 11. In 2:21-23, how do the promises of God's relationship to the people invert the names given to Gomer's children in chapter 1? What play on words do you see with "Jezreel"?
- 12. What did Hosea have to do in 3:1-2 to restore Gomer to her role as his wife?
- 13. How might this experience relate to Romans 5:6-8?
- 14. What might Gomer's period of seclusion (3:3) represent for Israel (3:4)?
- 15. Who would be "David their king" that Israel would later seek? (3:5)
